RING THE BELLS FOR PEACE ON NOVEMBER 11 – ARMISTICE DAY

On this Armistice Day, November 11, 2012—celebrating the end of World War I—we invite you to join Veterans for Peace (http://www.veteransforpeace.org/) and other organizations, endorsed by WILPF Disarm/End Wars Committee, in an action to call for the end of the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and to stop the potential war in Iran. We will be tolling bells on November 11, church bells or town hall bells or hand-held bells, in as many public places as we can find. While we are calling for our troops and planes to come home, we should remind people that

the U.S. signed a non-aggression treaty 84 years ago.

Remember the Kellogg-Briand Treaty? At the end of World War I, most Americans rejected war as a way of solving international problems. Signed in 1928 by 15 major powers, this treaty was soon joined by 39 more states. The U.S. Senate voted 85 to 1 to ratify. The treaty renounced the use of war, promoted peaceful settlement of disputes, and called for collective force to prevent aggression. It remains a binding treaty under international law. Its provisions are also in the UN Charter. Although it has failed to end war, the treaty has served as a legal basis for international norms making it unlawful to threaten or use military force against the integrity or political independence of any state.

Legitimate self-defense was allowed under the treaty, but no wars of aggression, and nations were to settle their disputes without war. Although it has not always been respected, the treaty has never been rescinded, and it served as the legal basis for

creating the notion of crimes against peace, first used at the Nuremberg Tribunal.

Let's reclaim November 11 for PEACE and put an end to war! Our government has renamed November 11 Veteran's Day, making it another celebration of the military and militarism. The US failure to join the rest of the world in the League of Nations helped sweep the Kellogg-Briand Pact under the rug. But now, despite frequent U.S. resistance, we have the United Nations, the World Court, the World Criminal Court, and a strong network of international laws building on Kellogg-Briand and other international agreements.

NOVEMBER HUMAN RIGHTS CAMPAIGNS

64 Day Campaign for Human Rights - October 7 to December 10

The US Human Rights Network http://ushrnetwork.org/content/campaignproject/64-day-campaign-human-rights began this year's campaign on October 7th. Each week focuses on a different issue: Oct 7-13, Indigenous Rights; 14-20, Poverty; 21-27, State Repression; 28-Nov 3, Immigrant/Migrant Rights.

Sunday 11 November – More About Armistice Day

On November 11, 1918, the guns of the "War to End Wars" finally fell silent after more than 29,000,000 soldiers had been killed or wounded. For many years, churches rang their bells 11 times at 11 a.m. on November 11, as at the end of the war. After the Second World War, the dedication of Armistice Day to world peace was lost to public consciousness, and in 1954 Congress changed its name to "Veterans Day." Veterans Day is a federal holiday, so students and some workers have the day off.

When Veterans Day falls on a Sunday, as it does in 2012, it is typically observed on the following Monday. We have the opportunity to use *both Sunday and Monday* for different kinds of observance.

Armistice Day will be observed with the traditional bell-ringing, as described on page 1. **Move to Amend** (https://movetoamend.org/or-portland), working for a constitutional amendment to end the legal fiction that corporations are persons and that money is speech, is an additional partner in restoring the Armistice Day tradition and its connection with the cause of world peace. Such an amendment is essential in the effort to abolish war as an instrument of national policy.

Monday 12 November – Veterans Day Holiday

This year, veterans are being honored on Veterans Day through A March to Save the Post Office. The event begins with a rally at Pioneer Courthouse Square. Veterans need jobs; they could be hired to fill postal vacancies. Some veterans already working for the postal service as "transitional" employees could move into career jobs with USPS. The rally cry is "No more cuts! No more closures!" After a march to 121 SW Salmon (outside Senator Merkley's office), another rally will be held to *oppose* HR 2309 (Postal Reform Act of 2011) and *support* HR 3591 (DeFazio's Postal Service Protection Act of 2011). http://thomas.loc.gov/cgibin/thomas can be used to find each of these bills by its number.

Sunday 25 November – International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women

It combines four former gender agencies: Division for the Advancement of Women (DAW), UN Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM), International Research and Training Institute (INSTRAW) and the Office of Special Advisor on Gender Issues (OSAGI). 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence

November 25 also initiates sixteen days of activism to end violence against women and girls. The 2012 theme is "From Peace in the Home to Peace in the World! Let's Challenge Militarism and End Violence Against Women." http://16dayscwgl.rutgers.edu/2012-campaign/theme-announcement

Human Rights Day

December 10 is the official Human Rights Day and ends the observance of 16 Days of Activism Against Gender Violence. Human Rights Day 2012 marks the 64th anniversary of adoption of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights in 1948, reflecting a significant change from the colonialism that prevailed at the time. http://www.greeningtheblue.org/event/human-rights-day-10-december-2012

October 6 Events: 2012 WALK TO END SLAVERY

WILPF's Barbara Drageaux reported enthusiastically about this October 6 event at Director Park in downtown Portland, calling it "A rally that inspired this old activist!" Five St. Mary's Academy seniors shared basic facts about human trafficking—modern slavery—which disturbed them so much that last year they collected a group of their peers and created an actual nonprofit organization, Youth Ending Slavery – YES. See http://www.youthendingslavery.org/ for event videos and information about the many forms of modern day slavery and actions we can take action to end it.

The event began with a brief talk by County Commissioner Diane McKeel. In recent months, Portland has made headlines as the second-worst city in the nation, a virtual hub for juvenile sex-trafficking. Commissioner McKeel gave information about Multnomah County's Community Response to Commercial Sex Exploitation of Children (http://web.multco.us/csec/), which coordinates the efforts of community members in reporting, investigation and prosecution of crimes; supporting appropriate legislation; and providing support services for survivors of sex trafficking.

After McKeel's talk, about 300 young people walked a one mile loop around downtown Portland, learning that slave labor, often by children, is used to produce many of the favorite brands they buy in local stores. http://www.free2work.org/ provides a useful guide for conscientious buyers of brand-name products, based on an assessment of company policies, transparency, worker rights, risk data, and reported issues.

WILPF members and friends may not be aware that the UN established a Global Initiative to Fight Human Trafficking (http://www.ungift.org/) in 2007. Sex-trafficking of children is the third largest criminal enterprise in the world, according to the FBI. The majority of victims are young people between 18 and 24, but an estimated 1.2 million children are trafficked each year. YES is raising money to assist teens sheltered at **Athens House**, the only shelter for former sex-trafficked teens in Oregon. The five young women who founded YES plan to establish YES chapters at whatever colleges they attend.

October 6/7 Events: OCCUPY PORTLAND, NOT AFGHANISTAN!

Two days of action under the banner "Occupy Portland, Not Afghanistan" drew the participation of hundreds of people on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. The good-natured vibe of Saturday's rally in Shemanski Park bled into an energetic and focused march with stops at the Oregonian, City Hall, the "Occupy" Parks, and the Right2Dream Too camp in Old Town. Thanks to **Dan Handelman** for his detailed report.

At the rally, **Patchwork Family** and the **Raging Grannies** entertained with music as visitors circulated among literature tables and a birthday canopy for Occupy Portland. **Ani Haines** of KBOO hosted speakers marking 11 years since the invasion of Afghanistan: **Saba Ahmed** (Interfaith Council of Greater Portland) and **Karen Boyer** (Code Pink) on how drone warfare is making more enemies of the US in Pakistan and elsewhere; **Brian Willson** (Vietnam veteran, activist & author) and **Madelyn Elder** (Communications Workers of America), on better uses for the money now being spent on wars & occupations; **Charles Beshears** (Freedom Socialist Party) on US attacks on our constitutional rights; **Sindy Avila** on immigration policy changes; and **Ahjamu Umi** (Black Working Group) on achieving equal rights for all.

At its height, at least 500 people were in the streets. With another hundred or so in the park and folks coming in and out over the five hours, the best estimate is that at least 700 people were involved on Saturday. About 70 people attended the teach-in at Portland Community College's Cascade campus on Sunday, where two sets of 90-minute workshops were held during the afternoon. The ten workshop topics were listed on page 1 of the Portland WILPF October newsletter.

The two articles below are based on presentations heard at Eliot Center, First Unitarian Church, on the evening of 12 October. Ret. Col. Ann Wright shared her speaking time with Trudy Cooper, who had just returned from Pakistan.

THOUSANDS MARCH IN PAKISTAN IN PROTEST AGAINST DRONE WARFARE

Trudy Cooper was one of three Portlanders in the party of 30 men and women, ages 22 to 80, organized by Code Pink to join Pakistani politician Imran Khan and thousands of Pakistanis on this 230-mile march from Islamabad to South Waziristan, a region that has been particularly subject to American drone attacks for some time now. http://www.codepink4peace.org/article.php?id=6174

Trudy confessed to feeling apprehensive as their plane landed in Islamabad. A large crowd was there, chanting and waving signs; she soon realized that they were welcoming the American visitors. Indeed, this scene was repeated throughout her stay. Most people had never seen anyone from the U.S. They saw the visitors as their only hope, since their own government is "unable to stand up to the U.S." It has done nothing to stop the drone strikes, which amounts to "implied consent" in the eyes of Pakistanis.

The march stopped short of entering the tribal areas when the Army turned Khan and his supporters away. Code Pink turned back even earlier, at Dere Ismail Khan (the last stop before South Waziristan), to avoid making the march a target of violence. Trudy believes the main outcome of their trip was raising public awareness of drone strikes. Her group visited the American ambassador in Islamabad and found that even he was not aware of the number of children killed till they showed him photos of pieces of clothing collected by survivors.

FREEDOM FLOTILLAS and GAZA'S ARK

Ann Wright is a retired Army colonel and diplomat who participated in the 2010 and 2011 Freedom Flotillas which tried to break the Israeli blockade and bring humanitarian relief to Gaza. On 7 October 2012 the Swedish boat *Estelle*, flying a Finnish flag, carrying a full load of relief supplies, left Naples on its way to Gaza.

The Israeli navy seized the ship in international waters on 19 October and diverted it to Ashdod in southern Israel. The more than two dozen people on board, including six European and Canadian lawmakers, were taken into custody in Israel. http://www.guardian.co.uk/world/2012/oct/20/gaza-ship-estelle-israeli-forces

Israel's "Operation Cast Lead" left Gaza in ruins in early 2009, with its 1.7 million people essentially 'imprisoned' there. Under present conditions, Gaza will be uninhabitable by 2020. Lacking any water treatment plants, Gaza must dispose of 8 million gallons of raw sewage into the Mediterranean daily. The blockade limits fisherpeople to the polluted waters within 2 miles of shore. http://www.huffingtonpost.com/news/gaza-blockade/

The 'inside-out' plan to overcome Israel's blockade of Gaza. The people of Gaza themselves are not calling for aid. They want conditions under which they can use their skills in life-sustaining occupations. The Gaza's Ark initiative is a response to this desire. Here is the initiative, shortened from http://www.gazaark.org/:

Gaza's Ark will recondition a boat [already] in Gaza, using Palestinian hands and expertise, with existing resources...[Doing so] will help revitalize the dwindling ship building industry in Gaza and help ensure the transmission of this disappearing expertise (another effect of the blockade) to the younger generations. Through Gaza's Ark and trade deals secured between Palestinian producers in Gaza and international businesses and NGOs, a channel will be established to export Palestinian products from Gaza. A crew of internationals and Palestinians will sail it out of Gaza, the only Mediterranean port closed to shipping, carrying Palestinian products to fulfill trade deals with international buyers, to challenge the illegal...Israeli blockade.

As Ann Wright told Portlanders on October 12, this strategy aims to break the Israeli naval blockade by sailing forth from Gaza. Should the ship be stopped, the Israelis will be opening themselves to a large number of civil lawsuits brought by international firms and individuals who expect to receive goods for which they have already paid!

AMY GOODMAN'S TALK IN PORTLAND, OCTOBER 25

Democracy Now! founder and executive producer Amy Goodman spoke at Portland's Bob White Theater during a 100- city tour to promote her book, <u>The Silenced Majority: Stories of Uprisings, Occupations, Resistance and Hope, co-authored with Denis Moynihan. Released this fall, the book is number five on the New York Times bestseller list.</u>



Goodman's tour began in August at the Republican National Convention and concludes November 17 in Los Angeles. She took us back to January 2011 by discussing the "globalization of dissent" manifested in huge demonstrations from Tahrir Square to Madison, Wisconsin, and in the growth of the world-wide Occupy Movement. She expressed concern about climate change, the death penalty, militarization of U.S. police, and violence against women. We heard stories from the tour about ways in which ordinary people can change the media and the world. She finds hope in the growth of independent community radio and television since the 1980s, when she started at WBAI-FM (Pacifica). Democracy Now! was carried on only a handful of stations when it began in 1996. It is now broadcast by 1118 stations around the world.

Goodman also highlighted her talented, hard-working staff, some of whom have risked their safety and liberty to provide independent, thorough coverage of news events ignored or trivialized by mainstream media. Like many of her appearances on this tour, the evening was a benefit for local community radio station KBOO-FM, which broadcasts *Democracy Now!* at 7 am and 4 pm weekdays.
