TWO EVENTS on THURSDAY EVENING, AUGUST 1

The Grotesque Injustice of Guantánamo: An Insider's Account 7 pm, Buchan Reception area, First Unitarian Church. Speakers include Steven T. Wax, chief Federal Defender for the District of Oregon, who successfully defended Portland lawyer Brandon Mayfield; Laura Sandow, U.S. Navy veteran, who was serving at Guantánamo Naval Base when the first detainees were brought there in 2001-2002; and S. Brian Willson, former Viet Nam commander and long-time peace activist, who participated recently in a Portland hunger strike in solidarity with the Guantánamo hunger strikers. *Location & details in WILPF Calendar, page 5*.

The Almanac Trail Concert Tour with Rik Palieri and George Mann 7 pm, SEIU Hall In the summer of 1941, a musical group of labor activists known as "The Almanac Singers" climbed into a midnight blue Buick and blazed a trail across the USA, spreading the gospel of unionism and bringing folk music back to the people. The group, with members Woody Guthrie, Pete Seeger, Lee Hays & Mill Lampell, created a new kind of topical music, using old folk melodies to tell the stories of the times. The Almanacs' now almost-mythical journey has become an inspiration for legions of musicians, free thinkers, and gasoline gypsies, and has paved the road for many of today's singer/songwriters. Some seventy years later, with the help and guidance of Pete Seeger and The Woody Guthrie Archives, Rik Palieri and George Mann are recapitulating parts of the Almanac Trail tour. *Location and details on page 5*.

HIROSHIMA - NAGASAKI COMMEMORATION, TUESDAY, AUGUST 6

This year's program will feature the connection between Hanford Nuclear Reservation near Richland, WA, AND the nuclear bombing of Nagasaki. The "Fat Man" atomic bomb detonated over Nagasaki by the U.S. military on August 9, 1945, contained plutonium created at Hanford, now one of the most contaminated places on earth. The 6 to 7 pm program at the Japanese American Historical Plaza will be followed (8 to 9 pm) by a special art exhibition at Oregon Nikkei Legacy Center, 121 NW 2nd Avenue. *More information on page 5*.

Hundreds gathered on Saturday, July 28, for the Columbia River Climate Action organized by www.portlandrisingtide.org at Vancouver Landing on the west side of the I-5 bridge. After workshops 10:30-noon and rally speakers 12:30-2:30, boaters embarked in kayaks while pedestrians lined the west side of the bridge with signs, banners, and chants. Kayakers paddled against the current to stay in place while climbers maneuvered to position and display our message to corporations aspiring to export fossil fuels to Asia through Pacific ports:

AUGUST IS NUCLEAR FREE FUTURE MONTH

We in WILPF **Disarm/End Wars Issue Committee** are working with United for Peace and Justice (UFPJ) to develop the website http://nuclearfreefuture.org. We hope you will help us keep its resources page updated for use in August and throughout the year.

WILPF **Reaching Critical Will** staff helped develop this urgent petition to President Obama: http://www.nuclearfreefuture.org/2013/07/07/tell-president-obama-the-time-is-right-and-the-world-is-ready-to-negotiate-the-elimination-of-nuclear-weapons. You can sign it NOW. Let's tell President Obama, "The time is ripe, and the world is ready to negotiate nuclear weapons abolition now!" Obama needs to know that he has a significant constituency for a nuclear free future and an actual abolition treaty.

After you've signed the petition to President Obama, three more petitions bearing on abolition of nuclear industry projects can also be signed on line. You'll find links to their websites on the back of this page. It's easy to add your voice to the outcry for a nuclear free future.

And we can do much more. We now have two powerful U.S. Conference of Mayors Resolutions calling for global nuclear disarmament by 2020 and transfer of funds to meet the needs of cities. We also have, for the first time, legislation in Congress that seeks abolition by 2020. We should be able to promote all three together—and use them to inform, educate, and help achieve our goal.

In their 2012 resolution, the U.S. Conference of Mayors called for abolition by 2020 (see http://www.usmayors.org/resolutions/80th Conference/international08.asp). The 2013 resolution can be downloaded at http://wslfweb.org/docs/uscmres2013.pdf. And let's all promote HR 1650, introduced by Congresswoman Eleanor Holmes Norton. She adds, as does WILPF (http://wilpfus.org/story/promote-norton%E2%80%99s-hr-1650) the phasing out of nuclear power and the transfer of saved federal funds to dismantlement and human security. All House members will visit their home districts in August, an excellent time to schedule a meeting with those representatives most likely to become co-sponsors.

In WILPF we believe abolition is urgent, and the dangers to our own and future generations posed by the whole nuclear chain increase that urgency. The entire nuclear industry—from uranium mining to enrichment to nuclear power to proposed MOX fuel to weapons production to depleted uranium and nuclear waste with nowhere to go—is a devil's bargain that is already destroying our planet as nurturer of life.

The plutonium and cesium already produced by the nuclear industry during the past 70 years will continue to cause cancers, mutations and destruction of species for many thousands of years, probably long beyond the continued existence of human life on earth. Strontium-90 and tritium have shorter half-lives but nonetheless cause great damage while they last, with women and their reproductive systems 50 per cent more susceptible than men, and with children and unborn fetuses the most vulnerable of all. And the planet itself – the air, soil, rivers and seas – is threatened by radioactive nuclear waste with nowhere to go. WILPF members are working tirelessly to end the dangers that most threaten their own nearby environment, even as we strive to abolish the weapons of death which are their source.

These most powerful, terrifying and destructive weapons of war have been a **Faustian bargain** from the beginning. Those who have developed and used (or threatened to use) them to gain wealth, power, and dominion threaten us all with extinction and appear to have lost their own souls—their capacity for love and compassion—in the process.
