JANUARY REPORT from U.S. WILPF ISSUE COMMITTEES

<u>Advancing Human Rights</u>: Prepared a WILPF Policy Statement on Human Trafficking. Now forming a subcommittee on **CEDAW**, the UN Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Discrimination Against Women. You can download WILPF's CEDAW statement at <u>www.wilpfinternational.org/statement-elimination-and-prevention-of-all-forms-ofviolence-against-women-and-girls/</u>. Also preparing a WILPF statement of support for **Idle No More**, the global movement for environmental protection and indigenous sovereignty initiated by Canada's First Nations.

<u>Corporations versus Democracy</u>: Move to Amend (MTA) subcommittee is pushing for state ballot initiatives in Oregon, Washington, California and six other states, affirming that corporations are not persons and money is not speech (<u>https://movetoamend.org/</u>).

<u>Cuba, Women, and the Bolivarian Revolution</u>: Planning for the **UN CSW** (Commission on the Status of Women) annual meeting <u>http://www.wilpfinternational.org/csw-forum-2013/</u> in New York on March 5, and arranging US tours by Cuban speakers, Norma Guillard and Norma Vasallo.

Disarm/End Wars: See page 3 for Carol Urner's report about the **new campaign for a nuclear weapons abolition treaty by 2020**. Other goals: **Eliminating** nuclear power, uranium mining, and military use of depleted uranium; **ending** the use of weaponized drones in warfare and in extrajudicial assassinations; **dismantling** the war economy and shifting spending from the Pentagon to the people.

<u>Middle East</u>: Preparing a WILPF **BDS** (Boycott, Divest & Sanction) campaign against products made in illegal Israeli settlements in the Palestinian occupied territories. Urging all WILPF branches to join the **US Campaign to End the Israeli Occupation**, of which US WILPF is already a member (<u>http://www.endtheoccupation.org/</u>).

HUNGER & POVERTY PROGRAMS STILL AT RISK

Hunger and poverty programs are still on the table, as Congress tries to finish work on the 2013 budget by March 27. Advocacy organizations like Bread for the World (<u>www.bread.org</u>) have been on the defensive since 2009 in their effort to save **SNAP** (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly food stamps), **WIC** (nutrition support for Women, Infants, and Children), **EITC** (Earned Income Tax Credit), and **CTC** (Child Tax Credit) from the budget ax. Bread's Western Field Organizer, Robin Stephenson, told a January 12th meeting of the Oregon Faith Roundtable Against Hunger (OFRAH) that the remaining weeks before March 27 will be critical for protecting these vital programs from federal budget cuts.

WILPFers can help by sending postcards and making phone calls to members of the Oregon and Washington Congressional delegations. Urge them to oppose efforts to cut federal programs that combat poverty and prevent families from going hungry. Our representatives frequently tell us, "Even if you think I already support something, I need to hear from you." Let them know that they have a wide base of constituent support for these programs.

On the local level, you can ask your representatives in the Oregon Legislature to *support the extension and expansion of the Oregon Earned Income Tax Credit* that is included in the governor's proposed budget. Tell your state senator and representative that the EITC often enables working families to **lift themselves out of poverty**. At http://www.ocpp.org/2013/01/14/fs20130114-eitc-helps-quarter-million-families/, you can find out how many families in your legislative district have been helped by this tax credit.

VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT

On Tuesday 29 January, Senators Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and Mike Crapo (R-ID) announced legislation reauthorizing the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA).

VAWA, first passed in 1994, was reauthorized twice without drama, but in 2012 House Republicans balked at three new provisions in the Senate bill that expanded protections to gays and lesbians, Native Americans, and undocumented immigrants. Congressional sources say the main sticking point in getting a compromise was opposition to the tribal provisions in the Senate version. Those provisions would allow tribal courts to have jurisdiction over non-Indians who commit crimes of violence on Indian lands.

According to federal statistics, Indian women experience a higher rate of rape and sexual assault than any other racial group in the U.S. A large part of the problem is the ability of non-Indian perpetrators to harm Indians without fear of facing a tribal court. Instead, the federal justice courts are left with the job of prosecuting those crimes, and court officials have said they lack sufficient resources to handle them.

Not all House Republicans opposed the Senate tribal provisions. Darrell Issa (R-CA) and Tom Cole (R-OK) pushed for a deal to protect them. "In my view," said Cole, "the best remedy is to provide tribal communities with the same authority granted to every other local municipality to police their communities and protect their residents."

However, the failure to reauthorize VAWA in 2012 indicates how deeply the belief in white supremacy and 'manifest destiny' is imbedded in American culture. The U.S., Canada, Australia and New Zealand cast the only votes against the **United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples** in 2007. All four of these former English colonies have since signed on to UNDRIP, the U.S. not until 2010. New Zealand has advanced farthest in implementing indigenous rights, and Australian political leaders have proposed steps toward including recognition of aboriginals in the Australian constitution. Implementation of UNDRIP lags behind in Canada and the U.S.

NUCLEAR WEAPONS ABOLITION BY 2020 Success depends on each of us!

Join in a new WILPF campaign to abolish nuclear weapons by 2020. The present Portland WILPF Branch was born out of the 1960s campaigns. The time is ripe now to engage again!

Our President claims to want abolition, and so do many in the Pentagon and Congress. But since ratification of the new START Treaty, our nation has been racing in the opposite direction. \$53 billion is already committed for rebuilding the whole nuclear weapons complex. Profiteering aerospace corporations scramble eagerly for contracts. Warheads, and the missiles, planes and submarines that carry them, are being significantly "modernized" as though for Armageddon.

Most of the world is ready to start negotiations on an abolition treaty NOW. Despite U.S. resistance, Norway, Mexico and Austria have initiated open-ended meetings on a treaty. All UN members are expected to attend. Our task now is to build strong support in the USA.

DISARM-End Wars will be working closely with WILPF Reaching Critical Will staff at the United Nations. They are preparing action tool kits for all of us. It is delightful to learn that NGOs throughout the world will be joining us in demonstrations against bloated military budgets on April 15, US Tax Day. Please help prepare fliers and fact sheets for this and other occasions.

We will also work closely with Jackie Cabasso, WILPF member and Mayors for Peace representative in the U.S. WILPFers in Portland and Ashland have helped line up many of our **Oregon Mayors for Peace**. Former Portland mayors Sam Adams and Tom Potter support the Mayors for Peace campaign. In 2012 the US mayors' national convention voted unanimously in favor of a strong resolution calling for abolition by 2020. We need to publicize and support this resolution in Oregon communities. Surely the Administration and Congress will listen to the mayors, including those of our largest cities. It is time they also "listen to the women for a change." Join us!
