CELEBRATING JUNETEENTH

Juneteenth—June nineteenth--has been historically celebrated as the day that American slaves became free. Union General Gordon Granger arrived by boat at Galveston, Texas, on June 18, 1865, to occupy Texas for the federal government, signifying that the Civil War had ended. He brought word of the total emancipation of slaves. Former slaves rejoiced in the streets, and in the following year these freedmen and freedwomen organized the first of what became annual celebrations of Juneteenth in Texas. As Texans went to other places, this custom spread across the country.

Traditionally, Juneteenth has been a day to mark African-American slaves being freed — though some would argue that slavery did not officially end until later. Sharecropping and Jim Crow laws became the de facto slavery system, and in our time mass incarceration is the "new Jim Crow." Indeed, many people all over the world continue to be enslaved. All of us may be even now cooperating with the system of slavery when we seek to purchase clothing and food for the lowest price. The modern name for slavery is 'human trafficking.'

In the U.S., Juneteenth still focuses on the liberation of African-American slaves, and numerous celebrations around the U.S. call it National Freedom Day. Join us this year at the Juneteenth celebration in nearby Vancouver! It's on Saturday, June 18th; see Calendar.

THE OREGON HUMANITIES CONVERSATION PROJECT Socially Engaged Discussions Offered Across the Oregon/SW Washington Area

WILPF members will be interested in attending any number of area public discussions organized through the <u>Oregon Humanities Conversation Project</u>. In the Oregon Humanities' own words, the Conversation Project "brings Oregonians together to talk—across differences, beliefs, and backgrounds – about important issues and ideas." Local nonprofits and other organizations host one of their specially trained facilitators to moderate public discussion at a venue of the host organization's choosing.

Oregon Humanities posts a yearly catalog with a list of facilitators and the topics they specialize in. Themes range across a wide swath of relevant issues from food security to gender equality to government control and surveillance. Hosting organizations apply for one or several of the facilitating conversations, then Oregon Humanities works with them to coordinate time, venue and promotion.

One conversation topic relevant to WILPF members is Jade Aguilar's conversation called *Mind the Gaps, How Gender Shapes Our Lives*. An assistant professor of sociology and women's and gender studies at Willamette University, Aguilar talks about how gender shapes our identities and how we can better understand the complex ways gender affects our daily lives. Another conversation of interest is photographer Jim Lommasson's *Life after War, Photography and Oral Histories of Coming Home,* in which he talks about the emotional tribulation of homecoming for American veterans. Lommasson has collected oral histories from returning soldiers and documented their struggles upon returning home. In his conversation, participants consider the wars at home faced not only by returning veterans, but also by the communities in which they live.

The schedule for upcoming public conversations is listed on the Oregon Humanities calendar at their website. Currently, they have conversation projects scheduled through October, 2016. You can view their calendar here: http://oregonhumanities.org/calendar/

Roaming downtown Portland, including Oregon Historical Society, Farmer's Market and other sites. 100 years ago today, Portland became the only city in the US to arrest & jail birth control advocate Margaret Sanger on her first national tour. The five-man City Council called her *Family Limitation* pamphlet "lewd, obscene, and indecent," banned it from distribution, and ordered the police to arrest Sanger and take her to jail - which they did. They also arrested local hero Marie Equi MD, Sanger's friend and colleague, and were then followed by a couple hundred more women - plus some good men - who demanded to be arrested with Sanger and marched to the jail. The Birth Control Brigade (local historians and reproductive justice activists) will re-enact Sanger's visit to focus on arguments about *Family Limitation* in the US right now. Be on the lookout for them around downtown.
