WILPF-US Corporations vs Democracy has called for action April 22 through May 7 to end expansion of the Corporate Empire and Corporate Rule by 'Free' Trade Agreement. The third phase will culminate in the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP), unless we are able to stop the TPP by preventing Congress from granting it 'fast track' and letting it become law without public or Congressional scrutiny.

"JUNK FOOD NEWS" DOCUMENTARY on MAY 9, TABOR SPACE, 7-9

"Project Censored the Movie: Ending the Reign of Junk Food News" is an award-winning 2013 documentary film taking an in-depth look at what is wrong with U.S media today. It highlights the 38 years of work by Project Censored (www.ProjectCensored.org) since its founding in 1976 at Sonoma State University. With commitment to media literacy education as an antidote to top-down-managed news propaganda and censorship, its Campus Affiliates Program now connects hundreds of faculty and students at colleges and universities across the US and around the world.

Nolan Higdon, a history professor at multiple Bay Area colleges, is currently faculty adviser and research fellow for the project. He will be present for discussion plus Q&A at the 7 to 9 pm, May 9, event in the Tabor Space Annex Room, 5441 SE Belmont Street.

MOVING TOWARD NUCLEAR WEAPONS REDUCTION/ABOLITION

At 5:30 pm on June 4 Representative Earl Blumenauer will lead a Portland forum on "The Risks and Costs of Nuclear Weapons." WILPF member Carol Urner will receive a lifetime achievement award for her tireless work toward the abolition of nuclear weapons as a member of the WILPF-US issue committee DISARM/End War. Details about this forum are included in the Calendar at the end of this newsletter.

Legislation now in Congress to limit nuclear weapons expenditure. On February 27 Rep. Blumenauer introduced HR 4107, the Reduce Expenditures in Nuclear Infrastructure Now (REIN-IN) Act. A companion bill, S 2070, the Smarter Approach to Nuclear Expenditures (SANE) Act, was introduced in the Senate by Senator Ed Markey (D-MA). These bills would save \$100 billion over the next 10 years by reducing or eliminating unnecessary nuclear weapons programs, and they will increase Americans' safety by cutting the number of intercontinental ballistic missiles currently on 24-hour high alert from 450 to 150. HR 1650, the Nuclear Weapons Abolition & Economic & Energy Conversion Act of 2013, was introduced in April 2013 by Representative Eleanor Holmes Norton (Delegate-DC). It calls for nuclear weapons abolition by 2020 and for replacing nuclear power with truly renewable energy.

Calls for abolition of nuclear weapons and weapons of mass destruction. The U.S. Conference of Mayors has been on record since 2005 affirming the role of cities in advancing this goal. TAKE HEART FROM THE ABOLITION MOVEMENT

An Earth Day Message from Bill Bigelow

On this Earth Day, those of us fighting for climate justice and an end to the world's fossil fuel domination should take heart from the struggle against slavery.

[In 1858 abolitionists] were waging not just a moral struggle against the enslavement of human beings. Slavery was the largest industry in the United States, worth more than all the factories, banks, and railroads combined. In effect, the abolition movement aimed to expropriate without compensation the wealth of the most powerful social class in the country.

After about 30 years of antislavery activism, twice as many people were enslaved, more U.S. territory was dedicated to slavery, slaveowners possessed more wealth, and the federal government's commitment to slavery was greater than ever before. Yes, talk about grounds to be discouraged. Which brings us to today's climate crisis and the many reasons for despair.

Recently, I taught a unit on climate change at a local high school in Portland. I began by introducing students to the "three scary numbers" featured in Bill McKibben's important Rolling Stone article from last summer, "Global Warming's Terrifying New Math."

The first scary number is <u>2 degrees Celsius</u>. . .McKibben acknowledges that even a 2 degree rise in global temperatures is fraught with danger, but it's the only international consensus on a climate target—"the bottomest of bottom lines," writes McKibben. . .The second scary number is <u>565 gigatons</u>. According to the best scientific estimates, that's the amount of additional carbon that we can pour into the atmosphere and still hope to keep the rise in temperature to 2 degrees. Five hundred and sixty-five thousand million tons of carbon. It seems like a lot, until we hear that projections call for humanity to blast through our 565 gigaton quota in less than 16 years.

Which brings us to the final number that makes the other two numbers so frightening: 2,795 gigatons of carbon. This number represents the stored carbon in reserves held by coal, oil, and gas companies, and the countries that act like fossil fuel companies, like Kuwait.

Yes, 43 years after the first Earth Day, there are abundant reasons to be discouraged—and frightened, too. . .Every Earth Day, some of us are tempted to say things like "We live on the same planet; we're all in this together." But no, we're not. . .As the journalist and activist Naomi Klein has said, "[W]ith the fossil fuel industry, wrecking the planet is their business model. It's what they do."

In history we find hope—if we look for it. Our opponents today are no more reckless and ruthless than the people who made their living enslaving others. But they still measure life in dollars. This Earth Day we need to recognize that the fossil fuel industry is waging war on the planet—and on the future. And, like the abolitionists before us, we need to act accordingly.
